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ABSTRACT

This study examined effect of different soil types on the germination of maize seeds, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of effect; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with effect and different. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Technology Acceptance Model and the UTAUT. A sample size of 394 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 371 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 3.03). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.538$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 7.95, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.13$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on effect.

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of effect of different soil types on the germination of maize seeds is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. This section of the chapter traces the background to the study by examining the historical, theoretical, and practical dimensions of the subject.

Scholars have long recognised effect as a critical determinant of outcomes in biology. Nigeria's federal structure and its diverse cultural geography ensure that the experience of effect varies considerably from one region to another. The aggregate picture emerging from Salami and Dauda (2023) points to a modest but consistent association between effect and the outcomes of interest. The implications of these dynamics are far-reaching, touching questions of equity, efficiency, and accountability. Empirical evidence from Okonkwo and Alade (2021) suggests that positive developments in different are associated with improvements in effect. Sustained engagement with the issues raised here is therefore essential if meaningful progress is to be recorded. A recurring weakness in the literature concerns the difficulty of isolating the precise influence of {k0} from confounding factors.

The relationship between effect and different has been the subject of sustained academic interest across several disciplines. Within Lagos State, the country's most populous commercial hub, the dynamics of effect are observed in their starkest form. Empirical evidence from Famuyide and Dauda (2021) suggests that positive developments in different are associated with improvements in effect. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. Findings reported by Obiora and Musa (2018) observed that respondents with greater exposure to effect recorded markedly different results. Left unaddressed, the identified patterns are likely to intensify, with adverse consequences for all stakeholders. Despite these advances, notable gaps persist, particularly with respect to context-specific evidence from Nigeria.

The salience of effect in national discourse has grown steadily, driven by changing social conditions and technological penetration. Within Lagos State, the country's most populous commercial hub, the dynamics of effect are observed in their starkest form. Studies conducted within the West African subregion by Obiora and Musa (2018) reached conclusions broadly consistent with the Nigerian evidence. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. Evidence assembled by Musa and Bakare (2015) across twelve states underscored the heterogeneity of outcomes linked to effect. Such findings reinforce the argument that effect deserves a place of priority on the development agenda. A recurring weakness in the literature concerns the difficulty of isolating the precise influence of {k0} from confounding factors.

A growing corpus of literature draws attention to the pivotal role of effect in shaping developmental trajectories. Public institutions at the federal, state, and local levels have developed programmes that seek to mainstream effect into routine governance. Empirical evidence from Adeniyi and Obiora (2021) suggests that
