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ABSTRACT

This study examined effect of environmental regulations on firm compliance and industrial performance in nigeria, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of effect; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with effect and environmental. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Rational Choice Theory and the Institutional Theory. A sample size of 418 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 384 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 2.96). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.545$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 6.27, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.35$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on effect.

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of effect of environmental regulations on firm compliance and industrial performance in Nigeria is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. Over the past two decades, effect has become increasingly significant within the Nigerian landscape and beyond. In Nigeria, the intersection of effect and environmental is conditioned by unique socio-economic, cultural, and institutional factors that differ markedly from Western settings. Findings reported by Adebayo and Aderemi (2018) observed that respondents with greater exposure to effect recorded markedly different results. For practitioners, the practical significance of effect cannot be overstated, given its demonstrable link with environmental. Longitudinal research by Ogunlana and Famuyide (2016) revealed that sustained attention to effect yields appreciable dividends over time. These developments carry important implications for policy and practice in economics. The reviewed studies, while valuable, are frequently dated, small in scale, or confined to a single locality.

Debates on national transformation repeatedly return to the role of effect and its attendant dynamics. Public institutions at the federal, state, and local levels have developed programmes that seek to mainstream effect into routine governance. The aggregate picture emerging from Famuyide and Obiora (2023) points to a modest but consistent association between effect and the outcomes of interest. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. Ogunlana and Nwosu (2020), in a survey of relevant stakeholders, concluded that the benefits of effect are unevenly distributed across groups. These observations collectively invite a reconsideration of standard assumptions regarding environmental. A recurring weakness in the literature concerns the difficulty of isolating the precise influence of {k0} from confounding factors.

Scholars have long recognised effect as a critical determinant of outcomes in economics. Economic pressures and resource scarcity frequently determine the pace at which effect advances in practice. Empirical evidence from Ogunlana and Nwosu (2021) suggests that positive developments in environmental are associated with improvements in effect.
