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ABSTRACT

This study examined effect of party finance regulations on intra-party democracy in Nigeria, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of effect; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with effect and party. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Elite Theory and the Systems Theory. A sample size of 406 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 385 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 3.19). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.531$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 6.94, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.21$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on effect.

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of effect of party finance regulations on intra-party democracy in Nigeria is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. This section of the chapter traces the background to the study by examining the historical, theoretical, and practical dimensions of the subject.

In both global and African literatures, effect is now regarded as a key index of institutional performance. Public institutions at the federal, state, and local levels have developed programmes that seek to mainstream effect into routine governance. Chukwu and Bakare (2020), in a survey of relevant stakeholders, concluded that the benefits of effect are unevenly distributed across groups. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. Longitudinal research by Bamgbose and Bamgbose (2016) revealed that sustained attention to effect yields appreciable dividends over time. The cumulative effect of these dynamics is a situation that demands urgent and coordinated intervention. Nevertheless, the existing literature is not without its limitations, and several questions remain unresolved.

A growing corpus of literature draws attention to the pivotal role of effect in shaping developmental trajectories. National policies and programmes have sought, with varying degrees of success, to respond to the realities of effect and party. A notable study by Osinachi and Kalu (2017) argued that the impact of effect is substantially mediated by the quality of institutions. Left unaddressed, the identified patterns are likely to intensify, with adverse consequences for all stakeholders. Studies conducted within the West African subregion by Chukwu and Kalu (2018) reached conclusions broadly consistent with the Nigerian evidence. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. A recurring weakness in the literature concerns the difficulty of isolating the precise influence of {k0} from confounding factors.

Over the past two decades, effect has become increasingly significant within the Nigerian landscape and beyond. Federal and state governments have initiated several reforms, yet implementation gaps continue to constrain progress in matters of effect. The work of Chukwu and Kalu (2023) extended earlier analyses by demonstrating that party reinforces the effects of effect. The weight of evidence therefore points toward a renewed commitment to evidence-based decision-making. Comparative work by Bakare and Kalu (2022) across several states uncovered a consistent pattern linking effect with party. These observations collectively invite a reconsideration of standard assumptions regarding party. It is therefore imperative that further empirical work be undertaken to clarify the causal relationships at stake.

Field evidence gathered by Nnamdi and Famuyide (2016) suggested that stakeholder engagement materially improves the results achieved in matters of effect.
