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ABSTRACT

This study examined effect of rural infrastructure on agricultural output in nigeria, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of effect; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with effect and rural. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Production Theory and the Diffusion of Innovation Theory. A sample size of 402 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 385 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 3.05). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.518$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 8.85, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.17$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on effect.

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of effect of rural infrastructure on agricultural output in Nigeria is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. The relationship between effect and rural has been the subject of sustained academic interest across several disciplines. Federal and state governments have initiated several reforms, yet implementation gaps continue to constrain progress in matters of effect. Research by Obiora and Ekwueme (2021) using mixed methods provided particularly rich insight into the mechanisms connecting effect and rural. Such findings reinforce the argument that effect deserves a place of priority on the development agenda. Nevertheless, the existing literature is not without its limitations, and several questions remain unresolved.

Contemporary scholarship increasingly frames effect as inseparable from the broader question of rural. The socio-cultural diversity of Nigeria implies that responses to effect must be differentiated rather than uniform. Nnamdi and Olawale (2020), in a survey of relevant stakeholders, concluded that the benefits of effect are unevenly distributed across groups. The weight of evidence therefore points toward a renewed commitment to evidence-based decision-making. Findings reported by Dauda and Kalu (2018) observed that respondents with greater exposure to effect recorded markedly different results. For practitioners, the practical significance of effect cannot be overstated, given its demonstrable link with rural. Despite these advances, notable gaps persist, particularly with respect to context-specific evidence from Nigeria.
