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ABSTRACT

This study examined population dynamics and migration patterns in rural areas of Nigeria, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of population; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with population and dynamics. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Systems Theory and the Sustainable Development Theory. A sample size of 405 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 374 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 3.19). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.501$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 6.85, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.31$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on population.

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CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of population dynamics and migration patterns in rural areas of Nigeria is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. The salience of population in national discourse has grown steadily, driven by changing social conditions and technological penetration. Empirical evidence from Bamgbose and Nwosu (2021) suggests that positive developments in dynamics are associated with improvements in population. The weight of evidence therefore points toward a renewed commitment to evidence-based decision-making. A notable study by Salami and Ogbeide (2017) argued that the impact of population is substantially mediated by the quality of institutions. The cumulative effect of these dynamics is a situation that demands urgent and coordinated intervention. Despite these advances, notable gaps persist, particularly with respect to context-specific evidence from Nigeria.
