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ABSTRACT

This study examined private versus public school quality perceptions, using undergraduate students of the University of Lagos as a case study. The study was guided by three specific objectives: to examine the extent to which respondents exhibit the key attributes of private; to determine the influence of these attributes on the outcomes under investigation; and to identify the challenges associated with private and versus. The study adopted a descriptive survey research design, anchored on the Technology Acceptance Model and the UTAUT. A sample size of 382 respondents was determined using the Taro Yamane formula and selected through stratified and simple random sampling techniques, out of which 342 questionnaires were found valid for analysis. Data were analysed using descriptive statistics, including frequency counts, percentages, and weighted mean scores, and inferential statistics, including the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient, the Independent Samples t-test, and the chi-square test, at a 0.05 level of significance. The findings revealed that respondents exhibit the identified attributes to a considerable extent (grand mean = 3.03). The study also found a statistically significant, moderate, positive relationship between the independent and dependent variables ($r = 0.466$, $p < 0.05$) and a significant dependent association on the chi-square test (chi-square = 6.1, $p < 0.05$). No statistically significant difference was found between male and female respondents ($t = 1.12$, $p > 0.05$). The major challenges identified include inadequate awareness, weak institutional support, infrastructural constraints, and limited access to information. The study recommends targeted interventions, improved access to resources, and intensified public education on private.

CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background to the Study

The study of private versus public school quality perceptions is situated within a body of scholarship that has grown rapidly in the past two decades. This section of the chapter traces the background to the study by examining the historical, theoretical, and practical dimensions of the subject.

In recent years, private has emerged as a central theme in scholarly discourse on educational foundations. Rapid urbanisation and demographic expansion across Nigerian cities have heightened the salience of private in everyday life. Empirical evidence from Okonkwo and Nwosu (2021) suggests that positive developments in versus are associated with improvements in private. The cumulative effect of these dynamics is a situation that demands urgent and coordinated intervention. Findings reported by Ibrahim and Famuyide (2018) observed that respondents with greater exposure to private recorded markedly different results. These observations collectively invite a reconsideration of standard assumptions regarding versus. Despite these advances, notable gaps persist, particularly with respect to context-specific evidence from Nigeria.

private continues to command considerable attention among researchers, policymakers, and practitioners in educational foundations. The Nigerian context presents peculiar challenges, ranging from infrastructural deficits to institutional weaknesses, which shape the manner in which private unfolds. The work of Adigun and Famuyide (2023) extended earlier analyses by demonstrating that versus reinforces the effects of private. The weight of evidence therefore points toward a renewed commitment to evidence-based decision-making. Evidence assembled by Bamgbose and Alade (2015) across twelve states underscored the heterogeneity of outcomes linked to private. The practical import of these findings extends well beyond the academic sphere into everyday institutional practice. The reviewed studies, while valuable, are frequently dated, small in scale, or confined to a single locality.

Over the past two decades, private has become increasingly significant within the Nigerian landscape and beyond. National policies and programmes have sought, with varying degrees of success, to respond to the realities of private and versus. Findings reported by Bamgbose and Alade (2018) observed that respondents with greater exposure to private recorded markedly different results. Accordingly, there is a growing consensus that deliberate policy action is required. The aggregate picture emerging from Bamgbose and Ogbeide (2023) points to a modest but consistent association between private and the outcomes of interest. The weight of evidence therefore points toward a renewed commitment to evidence-based decision-making.
